### Compassion in Action: The Fight Against Hunger

Hunger is growing in our state. More Alaskans are turning to food pantries than ever before. At the same time, donations of both food and funds have dropped, which makes it harder to keep up with the need. Pantries across Alaska are feeling the strain.

Today, about 1 in 7 Alaskans, or more than 100,000 people, need food assistance. That is a big increase over last year. Children and seniors are especially impacted. More than 1 in 5 children face hunger, and Alaska ranks near the top in the nation for senior hunger. For many older Alaskans, Social Security is their only income, and it does not stretch far enough.

Food Bank of Alaska works every day to meet this rising need. Last year they distributed nearly 8 million pounds of food through about 150 partners. That included children's meals, senior food boxes, and millions of meals for families statewide. During the annual Thanksgiving Blessing, hosted through faith-based organizations, almost 10,000 households were able to gather for a holiday meal. Outreach efforts also connected families to SNAP so they could secure more than half a million additional meals. September is Hunger Action Month, a time to reflect on the reality of hunger here in Alaska and to join together to do something about it.

This work is only possible through volunteers. Nearly 1,000 people gave more than 16,000 hours of their time last year. Every meal shared, every box packed, and every hour given helps move us closer to a more compassionate Alaska.



# **Stewardship in RE (Religious Exploration)- We will be discussing and actively engaging the concept of stewardship throughout the year. Time, Talent and Treasure**

## **How will RE incorporate stewardship into learning for our children and youth?**

Stewardship in Unitarian Universalism involves caring for the environment, community, and resources. Explaining this concept to kids can be engaging and meaningful.

### **Key Concepts of Stewardship:**

- Responsibility: Teach children that stewardship means taking care of what we have, including nature, our community, and each other.
- Sharing: Emphasize the importance of sharing resources, whether it's time, talents, or material goods.
- Respect for Nature: Discuss how we can protect the environment and why it matters for future generations.

### **Activities to Illustrate Stewardship:**

- Nature Walks: Explore local parks or nature reserves, discussing the importance of plants and animals.
- Community Service: Involve kids in community projects, such as cleaning up a park or helping at a food bank.
- Creative Projects: Encourage children to create art or write stories about their favorite places and how to protect them.

### **Discussion Points:**

By using relatable examples and hands-on activities, children can better understand and appreciate the concept of stewardship within the Unitarian Universalist framework.




Kids/teachers/adults can bring dried/canned goods on Sunday morning. The teens will replenish the little food pantry outside of AUUF on a monthly basis.

### Compassion in Action: The Fight Against Hunger

Hunger is growing in our state. More Alaskans are turning to food pantries than ever before. At the same time, donations of both food and funds have dropped, which makes it harder to keep up with the need. Pantries across Alaska are feeling the strain.

Today, about 1 in 7 Alaskans, or more than 100,000 people, need food assistance. That is a big increase over last year. Children and seniors are especially impacted. More than 1 in 5 children face hunger, and Alaska ranks near the top in the nation for senior hunger. For many older Alaskans, Social Security is their only income, and it does not stretch far enough.

Food Bank of Alaska works every day to meet this rising need. Last year they distributed nearly 8 million pounds of food through about 150 partners. That included children's meals, senior food boxes, and millions of meals for families statewide. During the annual Thanksgiving Blessing, hosted through faith-based organizations, almost 10,000 households were able to gather for a holiday meal. Outreach efforts also connected families to SNAP so they could secure more than half a million additional meals. September is Hunger Action Month, a time to reflect on the reality of hunger here in Alaska and to join together to do something about it.

This work is only possible through volunteers. Nearly 1,000 people gave more than 16,000 hours of their time last year. Every meal shared, every box packed, and every hour given helps move us closer to a more compassionate Alaska.

We have enjoyed new and reborn social events like the Elders Dinner, the winter folk concert, the holiday sing-a-long, the Variety Show, the Fireside Chats, the upcoming Parents Night Outs, and many others. We joined with the UU Fellowship of Fairbanks to ordain Becca Bernard as a UU minister. We have shown up at Pride Fest and many rallies to support social justice. And we have increased communication with members through Save the Date cards. Thank you to all of the committees, teams, staff, and volunteers who helped to make these goals a reality!

Looking forward, the Board has identified several areas as top priorities for FY26. Those include increased outreach to visitors and new members, the establishment of social action pillars, attempting to build and expand upon existing social activities, establishing new revenue through the New Revenue Task Force, and promoting AUUF through targeted advertising and other means.

While we already are a welcoming congregation and reach out to visitors through the Connections Team and conversations on Sundays, Rev. Lise and I have agreed to contact all visitors to supplement the current outreach from the Connections Team. We hope that having different contacts from different people during the first few months after someone visits the Fellowship will encourage visitors to continue to attend and help to grow the Fellowship. ## #BiWeek: Affirming and Celebrating Bisexuality+

Did you know that more Americans identify as bisexual than as gay or lesbian? Among adults who identify as LGB (lesbian, gay, or bisexual), 62% say they are bisexual, according to the Pew Research Center in 2023.

#BiWeek has just come to a close, but it's not too late to affirm and celebrate bisexuality+!

#BiWeek is organized and promoted annually by three national nonprofit organizations—GLAAD, the Bisexual Resource Center, and Still Bisexual—and it concludes each year on September 23 with Bi Visibility Day. Bi Visibility Day (also called Celebrate Bisexuality

Day) has been celebrated every year since 1999, thanks to the work of activists who initiated it to raise awareness and challenge the erasure of bi+ people. . . . Because despite their numbers, bisexual people have been called the “invisible majority,” as this identity is often misunderstood and even invisibilized.

What is bisexuality anyway? People who identify as bisexual experience romantic or sexual attraction to people of more than one gender. Some people use other terms, such as pansexual, polysexual, omnisexual, fluid, queer, and more . . . thus, bisexuality+.

## **Stewardship in RE (Religious Exploration)- We will be discussing and actively engaging the concept of stewardship throughout the year. Time, Talent and Treasure**

**How will RE incorporate stewardship into learning for our children and youth?**

Stewardship in Unitarian Universalism involves caring for the environment, community, and resources. Explaining this concept to kids can be engaging and meaningful.

**Key Concepts of Stewardship:**

- Responsibility: Teach children that stewardship means taking care of what we have, including nature, our community, and each other.
- Sharing: Emphasize the importance of sharing resources, whether it's time, talents, or material goods.
- Respect for Nature: Discuss how we can protect the environment and why it matters for future generations.

**Activities to Illustrate Stewardship:**

- Nature Walks: Explore local parks or nature reserves, discussing the importance of plants and animals.
- Community Service: Involve kids in community projects, such as cleaning up a park or helping at a food bank.
- Creative Projects: Encourage children to create art or write stories about their favorite places and how to protect them.

**Discussion Points:**

- Ask questions like, "What does it mean to take care of our planet?" or "How can we help our friends and neighbors?"
- Share stories from Unitarian Universalist teachings that highlight stewardship, such as caring for the Earth or helping those in need.

By using relatable examples and hands-on activities, children can better understand and appreciate the concept of stewardship within the Unitarian Universalist framework.

### Compassion in Action: The Fight Against Hunger

Hunger is growing in our state. More Alaskans are turning to food pantries than ever before. At the same time, donations of both food and funds have dropped, which makes it harder to keep up with the need. Pantries across Alaska are feeling the strain.

Today, about 1 in 7 Alaskans, or more than 100,000 people, need food assistance. That is a big increase over last year. Children and seniors are especially impacted. More than 1 in 5 children face hunger, and Alaska ranks near the top in the nation for senior hunger. For many older Alaskans, Social Security is their only income, and it does not stretch far enough.

Food Bank of Alaska works every day to meet this rising need. Last year they distributed nearly 8 million pounds of food through about 150 partners. That included children's meals, senior food boxes, and millions of meals for families statewide. During the annual Thanksgiving Blessing, hosted through faith-based organizations, almost 10,000 households were able to gather for a holiday meal. Outreach efforts also connected families to SNAP so they could secure more than half a million additional meals. September is Hunger Action Month, a time to reflect on the reality of hunger here in Alaska and to join together to do something about it.

This work is only possible through volunteers. Nearly 1,000 people gave more than 16,000 hours of their time last year. Every meal shared, every box packed, and every hour given helps move us closer to a more compassionate Alaska.
