Carla Grosch: Rev. Grosch was a member of AUUF in the 1980s. She reluctantly left Alaska to go the UU seminary at Starr King before transferring to a seminary in Illinois and being ordained as a United Church of Christ minister. Jacqueline DuHart: Rev. DuHart was a member of AUUF when she lived in Anchorage (1990-2004). Refugee Assistance and Immigration Services (RAIS)

The Refugee Assistance and Immigration Services (RAIS) program of Catholic Social Services is honored to be the half portion recipient this June. Refugee Assistance & Immigration Services (RAIS) provides a bridge for refugees (individuals who have had to flee their countries of origin due to the tragedies of persecution and war) and other new arrivals from their former life experiences to the new skills required for success in the United States. Through a focus on economic self-sufficiency, community integration, and a respect for unique cultures, history and traditions, RAIS creates an environment of compassion and encouragement for refugees to flourish. We offer programming to clients statewide including case management, employment assistance, health case management and youth/elder programming.

On January 20, President Trump signed an Executive Order titled "Realigning the United States Refugee Admissions Program" which indefinitely suspended the resettlement of Refugees through the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP). While we are not receiving new arrivals through that program, we continue to serve more than 1,000 clients currently in Alaska. With the uncertainty of federal policy, loss of significant federal funds, and increasing client needs, community support is more important now than ever. Here are some immediate ways you can support:





The Meaning of the Pride Flag

Harvey Milk's election in 1978 as the first non-incumbent openly gay man to win an

election for public office in the United States made headlines across the country. Milk was an energetic public servant and activist who championed gay rights both locally and nationally. After several civil rights ordinances supporting equal rights for LGBTQ+ people in employment were overturned in Dade County, Eugene, Oregon and other communities, Milk sought to bring more visibility to the gay community and his constituents in the Castro. While the pink triangle, lambda symbol, green carnation, and even a lavender rhino had been used as symbols for the LGBTQ+ community, these were felt to be reminders of a grim past or too subtle to be recognized. Milk commissioned multimedia artist and drag queen Gilbert Baker, as well as tie-dye artist Faerie Argyle Rainbow, seamster and photographer James McNamara, and around 30 other people to create a potent symbol of progress. They focused their efforts on creating a flag because "flags are about proclaiming power".

Since the late 1970's, many iterations and dozens of other pride flags have emerged, often as a result of efforts to create visibility and foster inclusion. The Philly Pride Flag developed in 2017 by the Philadelphia Office of LGBT Affairs under the leadership of Amber Hikes, added a black and brown stripe to represent Black and Latino communities. In 2018, Portland, Oregon designer Daniel Quasar created the "Progress Pride Flag" that combines the transgender flag to represent gender-nonconforming people and those lost to HIV and AIDS.

Even though the original pride flags were sewn almost 50 years ago, we are facing uphill battles which echo previous challenges. Legislation protecting the rights of LGBTQ+ people is being overturned. There are efforts underway to strip away healthcare and access to equal opportunities for trans people. The US Navy ship *Harvey Milk* is being renamed and many symbols of pride seem less visible this year. We can also look to history to find a way forward: be visible, advocate for LGBTQ+, immigrants, BIPOC, and all community members, share visual symbols of progress to proclaim power, and find moments of joy. As Harvey Milk said in one of his last speeches, "I cannot prevent anyone from getting angry, or mad, or frustrated. I can only hope that they'll turn that anger and frustration and madness into something positive so that two, three, four, five hundred [people] will step forward.."

Low-income working people, determined to launch an organizing effort of their own that enabled them to build a collective solution, banded together with others in the community who had previously attempted to organize to change conditions in low-income communities. Students, teachers, professionals, clergy and other concerned residents joined in the effort on a volunteer basis to fight for a permanent solution to poverty.

AWA was founded as a free and voluntary unincorporated private membership association of the area's low-income workers. AWA's uniquely successful method of Systemic Organizing enables anyone who dares to care and is willing to work to build an organization that unites low-income workers with allies from all walks of life who are also affected by the economic problems faced by low-income workers.




